

What Is Rosh Hashanah?

Rosh Hashanah means "head of the year." It is the Jewish New Year.

For Jewish
people, the new
year does not
begin on
January 1.

It is a two-day celebration that usually occurs in September, 15th-17th September 2023.

During Rosh
Hashanah, Jewish
people ask G-d for
forgiveness for
things they have
done during the
year.

It commemorates G-d's creation of the world.

What does the word commemorate mean?

Commemorate means to show respect for or to celebrate someone or something.

Why Is Rosh Hashanah an Important Jewish Festival?

- Jewish people believe that on Rosh Hashanah, G-d looks at each of them to see what they have done, good and bad, in the previous year.
- They have ten days to repent or feel remorse over any wrongdoings during the year. Rosh Hashanah and the days surrounding it are a time for prayer, good deeds, and reflecting on past mistakes.
- Rosh Hashanah ends on Yom Kippur, also called the Day of Atonement. Jewish people may be forgiven for previous mistakes and misdeeds on this day.



What Happens During Rosh Hashanah?

- Unlike New Year's celebrations held on 31st December, Rosh Hashanah is a sombre holiday filled with prayer and self-reflection.
- Many Jewish people spend much of the holiday in prayer at a synagogue.
- The shofar gets blown during prayer services at Rosh Hashanah. The shofar is a curved ram's horn.
